# Value of cultural heritage touted in UNESCO talk

Ted Sykes, president of the American Queen Steamboat Company, said

a remark by UNESCO delegate Dr. Maurizio Carta resonated for him Tues-

"We must protect and preserve our cultural heritage, because it is the fountainhead of creativity," Carta said.
